This book focuses on reports found in the New Hampshire State Papers, Volumes 1-37, provides a fascinating insight in the historic role played by our ancestors in the history of NH from it's inception through the Revolutionary War.

In 1680, Robert Mason, grandson of the founder of New Hampshire, Captain John Mason, was named a proprietor for the New Hampshire Territory. He named his attorney, Richard Chamberlain as provincial secretary of the Territory. Richard Chamberlain is mentioned on numerous pages throughout this book.

In 1741 Benning Wentworth was appointed provincial governor of the New Hampshire territory by the King of England, During the first two decades of Governor Wentworth's term New Hampshire had been beset with Indian troubles. Captain John Chamberlain is mentioned throughout this book.

The French and Indian wars ended with the signing of the Peace of Paris in 1762. After the ending of this war and after the end of the Indian fighting, the entire north country of New Hampshire was ready to be explored, surveyed, and populated. Following Peace with France, Governor Wentworth arranged the purchase for the sum of fifteen hundred pounds of the unauthenticated claims of Robert Mason, heir of Captain John Mason. This was done through a group of twelve influential citizens who called themselves the "Masonian Proprietors." Having done this, the governor kept the land "within the province." Governor Wentworth, with all or most of the Masonian Proprietors as his councilors, then proceeded to grant towns to prospective settlers as equally as possible. Captain John Chamberlain became an influential agent for the Masonian Proprietors. In addition to the thirty-eight towns already granted, more than a hundred others followed after the year 1761. These towns contained lots available to more than thirty thousand families, many from the older towns in southern New Hampshire and Massachusetts, but many from other neighboring states. Some of these towns were located in Vermont, to be released later by a court order, which made the western shore of the Connecticut River the state boundary line. John Chamberlain appears as an original grantee of many of these new towns. Other Chamberlain's also appear as original grantees for numerous towns throughout New Hampshire. This book tracks the formation of hundreds of New Hampshire Towns from 1762 to 1775.

Benning Wentworth died in 1770. He was succeeded by his nephew who later became Sir John Wentworth, the last of the royal governors. The Revolutionary War soon followed. This book tracks the enlistments, companies, regiments, and discharges of numerous Chamberlains who fought with New Hampshire militia units during the Revolutionary War period

After the Revolutionary War, the New Hampshire Towns began to develop and grow. Members of Chamberlain families often took active and leadership roles in town, county, and state government. This book highlights many of these leadership roles.
